Stink; the incredible shrinking kid by Megan MacDonald

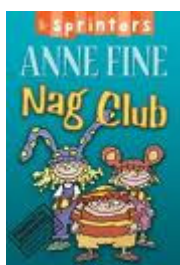

drawings will help children in overcoming fears.



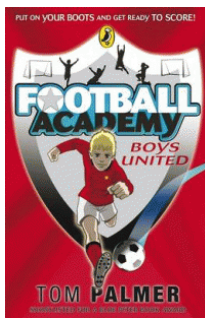
Nag Club by Anne Fine

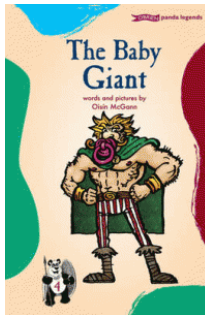
Mr Cool by Jacqueline Wilson

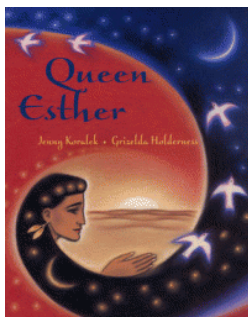
Football Academy: Boys United by Tom Palmer

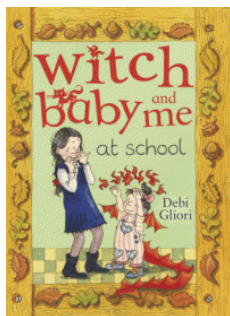
Baby Giant by Oisín McGann

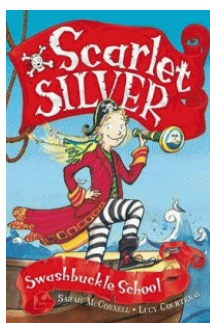
Queen Esther by Jenny Koralek
